A Play On Pollinators

"Buzz on Over"
Daisy - human girl
Honey - Honey Bee
Bumble - Bumblebee
Wasp
Beetle —ladybug
Fly

Props: Bug Hats, Apples, Pollen

Daisy:	Hi! My name is Daisy, just like the beautiful flower. I so love being outside. The air smells good and the trees and flowers are wonderful.
Bugs	(All buzz by)
Daisy:	BUGS! I am so afraid of bugs. What good are they anyway? I wish they would all just go away.
Honey:	AHEM. Excuse me! I am a Honey bee. Wait a minute. What did you say? You are afraid of bugs???? Why don't you like us?
Daisy:	I don't like you because all you ever do is buzzzz and bite!

Honey:	We do much more than buzz and bite. We POLLINATE.			
Beetle:	Hi there. I am a beetle. And I POLLINATE. (To the crowd} Can you say "Poll-i-nate"?			
Crowd: "Poll-i-nate"				
Beetle:	You should LOVE pollinators.			
Daisy:	EW! I should love pollinators? They're disgusting!			
Bumble:	Hi there little friend.I am a Bumble bee.Let me explain POLLINATION to you.For a pretty flower to become a yummy fruit with a seed, the pollen from one flower must get to another.			
Fly:	Greetings humans. I am a fly. Without POLLINATION there would be no Daisies, flowers, trees or bushes.			
Wasp:	I am a wasp-p-p-p-p. Did you know that lots of the time the pollinated flower becomes something you can eat? Like apples.			
Honey:	Peaches and watermelon.			
Beetle:	Beans and pears and strawberries.			
Bumble:	Tomatoes and peppers.			

Daisy:	Where does this POLLEN stuff come from?
Honey:	Good question, Miss Daisy. (Points to prop) This is a flower and these are the petals.
Beetle:	(Show Picture #1) Some flowers like a Daisy have a button-like center with lots of tiny tubes. That is where the POLLEN is.
Bumble:	(Show Picture #2) Some flowers have a tube called a spadix, a stalk crowded with tiny flowers. That is where the POLLEN is.
Fly:	Did you know that one out of every three things you eat? needs us as POLLINATORS?
Daisy:	One out of three? That is a lot! Are you insects the only pollinators?
Wasp:	No! The wind can pollinate. On a windy day, you can see the POLLEN in the air. If you have allergies like me, it will make you A-A-A-CHHOOOOOO!
Fly:	Hummingbirds, bats and butterflies can be POLLINATORS, too.
Daisy	OK – OK! I get it. Tell me how do YOU POLLINATE? Is it hard work?
Beetle:	When I crawl around on the center of a flower, the powdery pollen sticks to me. When I get to the next flower some of the pollen falls off and stays with that flower. TA DA! POLLINATION!
Honey:	I collect pollen on my fuzzy legs and take it home to feed my bay-beeeees. I have to visit many flowers to get enough for my bay-beeees and some POLLEN is always falling off.

Bumble: I do the same thing.

	It makes my ba-beeeees grow fast and strong. My whole body is fuzzy, so the POLLEN sticks all over me. Still some falls off as I visit many flowers.	
Wasp:	It sticks to me when I go to a flower for a sweet drink of nectar. So that makes me a pollinator, too.	
Fly:	WOW! It sticks to me, too.	
	I love spreading it around from flower to flower to flower to flower.	
Bugs:	(During Daisy's speech below each bug places flour on the palm of their hand and holds it in a fist.)	
Daisy:	I have changed my mind about bugs.	
	You do really good things. I wouldn't be able to eat and drink	
	the healthy foods that keep me strong and healthy without POLLINATORS!	
Daisy:	(Holds up apple basket with Thank You sign on it) Anyone want an apple?	
Daisy:	On the count of three let us thank the wonderful POLLINATORS!	
	1 - 2 - 3. Thank you POLLINATORS!	
Bugs:	You're Welcome! Here's POLLEN for ya!	
	(Blow flour off hands toward audience and bow, with a flourish.)
